An Island of Choices: Brands and Consumption in Socialist Cuba

Emilio Morales & Joseph L. Scarpaci

Overview

The collapse of the former Soviet Union and the fall of the Iron Curtain signaled a clarion call that championed global capitalism. Multinational corporations rushed to position themselves in the utility, manufacturing, and service industries that blossomed in Eastern Europe and the USSR. Across the Atlantic Ocean, however, Fidel Castro clung steadfastly to power. In 1993, his government reluctantly instituted a series of limited reforms to compensate for the demise of foreign aid from Moscow –estimated at approximately \$5 million daily— to stop the economic freefall on the island that began in 1989. These policies, part of a series of structural changes referred to as the ‘Special Period in a Time of Peace,’ ushered in a broad spectrum of national and international consumer products and services previously unknown to islanders. Limited joint ventures, relaxing the flow of remittances from the exile community in the USA and Europe, and a push towards international tourism drove this reform. In a few short years, Cubans were seeing foreign brands among consumer durables in dollar stores and a broad array of logos brought in by tourists; in 1989, just over 100,000 international tourists visited Cuba, but by the early 2000s, the figure had surpassed 2 million annually. Three decades of a closed, centrally-planned economy reluctantly employed a tepid Cuban-style *perestroika*.

Today, nearly two decades into these limited market reforms, it is curious that no systematic research has explored consumer brand awareness among 11 million Cubans living just 90 miles from the United States. The paucity of academic research stems from the challenges of conducting public/consumer opinion surveys and the Cuban government’s reluctance to share anything but favorable information with the international community. Official state policy contends that consumer wants and needs are satisfied by either a series of generic and Cuban-made brands, or by independent entrepreneurs (*cuentalpropistas*) who provide brandless products and services. This book, however, fills this research gap.

An Island of Choices: Consumption and Brands in Socialist Cuba

analyzes the role, narratives, and behavior of consumption since 1959. It documents how consumer behavior has changed since the pre-revolutionary period, with a special focus on the Special Period in a Time of Peace that began in the early 1990s. The book documents the shift from moral-based rewards in the early years of the Revolution, to the rise of material-based incentives. To anchor our study of Cuban consumption empirically, we draw on primary data that analyzes and situates the level of brand awareness and brand values among a national sample of 780 consumers in Havana City Province and eight other provinces.

Our book will debunk the notion that communist Cuba has been able to separate from the minds of Cubans the differences between essential and non-essential consumer

goods and services. We find Donald Hilton's theory of cultural branding to be particularly robust in understanding Cubans' attachment to certain products. Cubans have long been exposed to foreign mass media in the form of movies, music videos, and limited cable television shown in hotels and tourist centers. Although the Internet is highly regulated and firewalls limit what university and government researchers assess, the Cuban diaspora in exile brings back clothing, personal care products, electronic goods, and magazines that increase the awareness of brand logos, jingles, products, and services.

Our survey reveals that more than 800 brands were identified by respondents/informants. Findings also show that McDonald's™ and Sears,™ garnered 3% and 4% of all brand responses in the quick-service restaurant and retail categories, respectively, even though the former has never operated on the island, and the latter was closed following the 1959 revolution. These and related findings are ripe with marketing implications such as substitution effects, price elasticity, latent demand for certain products and services, and consumer behavior.
